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
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IN AUSTRALIA

Event Criteria

This overview of the event criteria provides parents, school leadership teams and general audience members with an insight into where their ensemble currently sits in the broader school instrumental music context.

The ASBOF is a non-competitive and educational event, therefore Music Directors are encouraged to select an event level which will challenge their ensemble and the individual musicians therein to continue developing their musical ability. We are aware that school ensembles change personnel from year to year. It is our expectation that schools consistently achieving gold ratings will look to challenge themselves by moving to a higher event level. Parents and school leadership teams should be aware that a band moving to a higher level may take a year or two to attain the standard capable of achieving a Gold award in that event category.

It runs counter to the philosophy of the Festival for a school to select an event level below the ability of their ensemble in order to ensure a Gold award. Parents and school leadership teams are encouraged to support MDs in continually challenging the students as they mature the instrumental program within their school.

Since 2015 it has been mandatory for all ensembles participating in the Australian School Band and Orchestra Festival to perform an Australian music item at all Festival event levels. The rationale behind this is to promote a home grown Australian music culture and to support the many Australian artists who are currently composing and arranging for school ensembles.

All ensembles entering the Festival are required to:

- Present a contrasting program. A slow melody, lyrical/tone piece allows the adjudicator to assess the musical capabilities of the ensemble.
- Perform a program which complies with the time requirements of the section they have entered.
- Include at least one Australian composition in their program.

SECONDARY SCHOOL WIND BAND CRITERIA

The PERCY GRAINGER Event: Secondary School Concert Bands, Premier Event

Music Guide: Grade 5.0 and upwards. Total playing time: 20-25 minutes

This is the Premier Event of the Festival and is open to secondary school concert bands of the highest ability level.

The JODIE BLACKSHAW Event: Secondary School Concert Bands - Advanced

Music Guide: Grade 4.0 and upwards (at least one Grade 5.0) Total playing time: 20 minutes

For established bands performing at a high level or which may lack the complete instrumentation to qualify for The Percy Grainger Event.

The DAVID STANHOPE Event: Secondary School Concert Bands - Advanced

Music Guide: Grade 3.0 and upwards (at least one Grade 4.0) Total playing time: 15 minutes

This event is intended for established bands which perform at a high level, comprised mostly of accomplished players typically having played for three or more years. These bands will have a broad range of instrumentation, including any scored percussion.

The GRAHAM LLOYD Event: Secondary School Concert Bands - Advanced

Music Guide: Grade 2.5 (at least one Grade 3.0-3.5) Total playing time: 13 minutes

This event is intended for established bands which perform at a good level, comprised mostly of competent players typically having played for three or more years.

The RAYMOND HANSON Event: Secondary School Concert Bands - Intermediate

Music Guide: Grade 1.5 and upwards (at least one 2.0-2.5) Total playing time: 11 minutes

This event is intended for developing bands which perform at a competent level. Players in these bands will typically have played for one to three years.

The GEORGE DREYFUS Event: Secondary School Concert Bands - Beginner to Intermediate

Music Guide: Up to Grade 1.5 Total playing time: 9 minutes

This event is intended for bands which perform at an elementary level from schools with a single band program or development bands in schools with established programs. Players in these bands will typically be first or second year players.

SECONDARY SCHOOL BIG BAND CRITERIA

The FRANK COUGHLAN Event: Premier Big Band Event - Invitation ONLY

Music Guide: 25 minute contrasting program

The Premier Big Band event of the Festival, for bands consisting of the traditional big band line up. Artistic Director, John Morrison, will determine which bands are eligible from year to year. Bands are expected to feature soloists (including vocals) and must adhere as closely as possible to the traditional big band instrumentation. This event may take place in a commercial environment (a club auditorium or similar).

The JUDY BAILEY Event: Secondary School Big Bands - Advanced

Total playing time: 20 minutes (4 pieces max)

Open to all secondary school big bands playing at an advanced level. It is expected that bands playing in this event will attempt to restrict themselves to traditional Big Band instrumentation where possible.

The DON BURROWS Event: Secondary School Big Bands - Advanced

Total playing time: 15 minutes (3 pieces max)

This event is open to all secondary school big bands playing at an intermediate to advanced level. It is permissible for bands in this section to use alternative instrumentation, although it is expected they attempt to restrict themselves to traditional Big Band instruments where possible.

The JOHN MORRISON Event: Secondary School Big Bands - Novice

Total playing time: 10 minutes

This event is open to secondary school big bands which perform at an elementary level including Training Band/Beginner Bands from established band programs, newly formed bands with typical first year players, or players who have not previously performed in public. Electronic instruments (keyboard bass etc - up to 4) are permitted in this section.

SECONDARY SCHOOL STRING ENSEMBLE CRITERIA

The ERNEST LLEWELLYN Premier Event for Secondary School String Ensembles

Music Guide: Grade 3.0 and above. Playing time: 15 minutes

This event is intended for established ensembles which perform at a high level, comprised mostly of accomplished players typically having played for three or more years. These ensembles will have a strong coverage of all sections, including any scored percussion.

The LORETA FIN Event for Secondary School String Ensembles

Music Guide: Grade 1.0 - 2.5 and above. Playing time: 12 minutes

This event is intended for established ensembles which perform at a good level, comprised mostly of competent players typically having played for three or more years.

The DONALD HAZELWOOD Event for Secondary School String Ensembles

Music Guide: Up to ensemble level 1.5. Includes unison playing. Open string parts permitted.

Playing time: 8 minutes

This event is intended for ensembles which perform at an elementary level from schools with a single ensemble program or a development ensemble in schools with established programs. Players in these ensembles will typically be first or second year players.

SECONDARY SCHOOL ORCHESTRA CRITERIA

The RICHARD GILL Premier Event for Secondary School Orchestras

Music Guide: Open. Playing time: 18 minutes

This event is intended for established ensembles which perform at a high level, comprised mostly of accomplished players typically having played for three or more years. These ensembles will have a strong instrumentation coverage of all sections, including any scored percussion.

PRIMARY SCHOOL CONCERT BAND CRITERIA

The ALEX LITHGOW Event: Primary School Concert Bands, Premier Event

Music Guide: Grade 2.5 and upwards. Time limit: 15-18 minutes

The Premier Event for Primary School Bands demanding a high standard of musicianship across a range of instrumentation. Bands are expected to use the instrumentation as scored. Substituting in electronic instruments would typically exclude a band from this premier event.

The WILLIAM LOVELOCK Event: Primary School Concert Bands - Advanced

Music Guide: Grade 2.0 - 2.5 Time limit: 12 minutes

Intended for established bands which have been performing at a high level for several years whose players are competent, but which may lack the instrumentation to qualify for the Alex Lithgow Event.

The JOE COOK Event: Primary School Concert Bands - Advanced

Music Guide: Grade 1.5 - 2.0 Time limit: 10 minutes

Intended for established bands which have been performing at a good level for some years or Lovelock/Lithgow level bands which are in the process of rebuilding. Competent players with two or more year's experience.

The ROBERT McANALLY Event: Primary School Concert Bands - Intermediate

Music Guide: Grade 1.0-1.5 Time limit: 8 minutes

Intended for developing bands formed for more than twelve months, which play at a competent level and whose players have had 12 months or more experience playing their instrument. This section may include more experienced bands with limited instrumentation.

The WILBUR SAMPSON Event: Primary School Concert Bands - Beginner Bands

Music Guide: Grade 0.5-1.0 Time limit: 6 minutes

Intended for beginner bands formed this school year, schools with newly established band programs and bands whose players have been learning for fewer than twelve months.

PRIMARY SCHOOL BIG BAND CRITERIA

The ED WILSON Event: Primary School Big Bands - Open

Time limit: 12 minutes (3 pieces max)

Intended for established bands which have been performing at a competent level. Bands are encouraged to feature a soloist (including vocals) and are expected, as far as possible, to restrict themselves to the traditional big band instrumentation. Rescoring for up to four (4) electronic instruments (e.g. Keyboard bass) is permissible.

The GRAEME BELL Event: For Primary School Big Bands - Novice

Time limit: 8 minutes (2 pieces max)

Intended for bands formed within 12 months performing at an elementary level or training bands from an established band program. Players typically first or second year players. Bands are encouraged to feature a soloist (including vocals) and are expected, as far as possible, to restrict themselves to the traditional big band instrumentation. Rescoring for up to four (4) electronic instruments (e.g. Keyboard bass) is permissible.

PRIMARY SCHOOL STRING ENSEMBLE CRITERIA

The BRETT DEAN Premier Event for Primary School String Ensembles

Music Guide: Grade 2.5 and above. Playing time: 12 minutes

This event is intended for established ensembles which perform at a high level, comprised mostly of accomplished players typically having played for three or more years. These ensembles will have a strong coverage of all sections, including any scored percussion.

The DULCIE HOLLAND Event for Primary School String Ensembles

Music Guide: Grade 1.0-2.0 Playing time: 8 minutes

This event is intended for established ensembles which perform at a good level, comprised mostly of competent players typically having played for three or more years.

The NIGEL BUTTERLEY Event for Primary School String Ensembles

Music Guide: Up to ensemble level 1.0. Includes unison playing. Open string parts permitted.

Playing time: 6 minutes

This event is intended for ensembles which perform at an elementary level from schools with a single ensemble program or a development ensemble in schools with established programs. Players in these ensembles will typically be first or second year players.

PRIMARY SCHOOL ORCHESTRA CRITERIA

The ELENA KATS-CHERNIN Premier Event for Secondary School Orchestras

Music Guide: Open. Playing time: 12 minutes

This event is intended for established ensembles which perform at a high level, comprised mostly of accomplished players typically having played for three or more years. These ensembles will have a strong instrumentation coverage of all sections, including any scored percussion.

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Adjudicator JODIE BLACKSHAW



Jodie Blackshaw (b. 1971) is a proud regional Australian who grew up in the southeast of rural Australia (Wiradjuri) and formed a very personal relationship with music early in life through the creative application of her imagination to musical colours and movement. Today, she continues to seek creative experiences for students through her teaching and composing so they, too, may enjoy the personal relationship she discovered in her formative years.

Jodie has won multiple awards for her compositions and proudly composes music for all age groups and capabilities. In 2020 she completed her PhD in Composition studying with Carl Vine and later, Australian indigenous composer Dr. Christopher Sainsbury. Her music has been featured as test pieces in state and national competitions, appears on numerous state curriculum repertoire lists and has been performed by numerous

school and professional ensembles throughout Australasia, Europe and the Americas.

Jodie has thrice presented at the Midwest Clinic in Chicago (2012, 2014, 2018) as well as conducted residencies and/or conference presentations in the Middle East, Hong Kong, Vietnam, The Netherlands, throughout Canada, Australia and the United States. She is published by Manhattan Beach Music, GIA Music Inc., Alfred Music and is exclusively distributed by Brolga Music/C. Alan Publications.

Blackshaw is passionate about exploring and developing the sound of wind band music and believes that programming and performing composers with a different "sound world" is key. To that end, she founded the Female Band Composer database in 2017 (https://www.jodieblackshaw.com/female-band-composers) which is now cited as a tool for repertoire selection by several leading educational institutions, curriculum programs and wind band performance conferences including The Midwest Clinic. In 2018 Blackshaw founded the website www. colourfullmusic.com in response to a panel presentation she curated for the Midwest Clinic entitled 'Directors for Diversity'. ColourFULL Music shares diverse wind band programs created by an international array of leading conductors within the wind music community and now has a following of more than 5000 music educators and conductors.

In July 2022 Jodie proudly became a board member of the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles (WASBE).

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Adjudicator JOHN KOENIG



Dr. John R. "Rusty" Koenig recently completed his doctoral degree in instrumental conducting at the University of Hartford, Hartt School of Music where he studied with Glen Adsit and Edward Cumming. At Hartt he co-directed the Symphony Band, Wind Ensemble, and the Foot in the Door contemporary ensemble and served on the conducting and music theory faculties. In the summer, John teaches a course on teaching school children to compose for the Hartt Master's Degree Summer term program. He also frequently collaborates with the Hartt orchestra, conducts for ballet performances, and music directs in the theater department.

Outside of Hartt, he has conducted bands and orchestras in Italy and Bulgaria. He has collaborated with leading composers including Shuying Li, Susan Botti, Michael Torke, Gilda Lyons, and Joseph Schwantner. A proponent of new music, he has premiered over fifteen works in the last three years, including the world premiere of Joseph

Schwantner's newest percussion concerto, Fast Track: Concerto for Percussion and Wind Ensemble, an analysis of which was the basis for his doctoral essay which can be found on ProQuest.

Prior to his studies at Hartt, he studied wind ensemble conducting with Scott Boerma at Western Michigan University. Before arriving at WMU, he studied music education at The Florida State University and taught middle school band in Florida where he offered beginning, intermediate, advanced, and jazz band instruction to over 200 students. His teaching career began at age 15 when he joined the faculty of the Bahama Village Music Program in his hometown of Key West, Florida, and he has been teaching ever since.

John has recently been an adjudicator and clinician for the 2025 Six Flags festival at Stratford High School for jazz band, concert band, and orchestra in April of this year. He has also been adjudicator for the Connecticut Music Education Association's regional honor bands from 2023 until the present.

Racheal is now based in Sydney NSW, where she works as a freelance musician and educator, and as a member of the Royal Australian Navy Band.Racheal enjoys an active career as a performer around the Sydney area, often found playing at local clubs such as Foundry 616, Lazybones, and Camelot Lounge.

Her time with the Royal Australian Navy Band has seen Racheal perform all around the globe. Earlier this year she travelled to France to take part in ANZAC Day commemorations, and has also previously travelled to Turkey, England, Spain, Italy, Greece, Morocco, South Africa and Mauritius, performing as part of the RAN Band.

Some of Racheal's other career highlights include; performing the opening fanfare for the Australian Open final at Rod Laver Arena in 2013, and performing the Last Post on ANZAC Day 2020 for the ABC live broadcast.

Adjudicator GERALD STEINMANN



Gerald commenced his professional music career in the military where he performed at many vice-regal occasions, including the Mounting of the Royal Guards at Buckingham Palace and Windsor Castle, and was recognised an award-winning musician.

Since retiring from the military Gerald has been heavily involved as a performer and educator throughout Australia. From performing in bands for A-List celebrity events, to working on cruise ships around the world, Gerald's talents are always in constant demand.

Gerald has founded band and other ensemble music programs at a number of schools throughout Sydney and regional NSW. He currently directs ensembles

across schools from Sydney to the far north coast of NSW, as well as being engaged as a performer, composer, arranger, advisor, adjudicator, event consultant, and guest conductor.

Gerald has adjudicated at many events, including the Sydney Eisteddfod and the Yamaha Band Festival. Gerald has a long association with the Australian School Band and Orchestra Festival as a music director, adjudicator, and clinician at ASBOF music educator conferences. Gerald is a member of the ASBOF Advisory Board and is also the ASBOF specialist percussion advisor.

Gerald is the recipient of an ARIA Gold Record Award, holds a Graduate Diploma of Music and continues to perform with a multitude of bands and orchestras throughout NSW and Qld.

A gift for the pianist in your family When he is not assisting the Australian School Band and Orchestra Festival as a photographer, Southern Highlands music teacher, Chris Donaldson, turns his hand to composition. "After 50 years of teaching piano, I decided to celebrate by making small musical tributes to many of the composers who have enriched my life, and those of my students, over many years" said Donaldson. 32 Variations for Piano on Happy Birthday celebrates the musical styles of 32 composers, commencing with JS Bach, and culminating in a tribute to Elena Kats-Chernin, after whom the ASBOF Primary School Orchestra event is named. Each variation contains samples of the composers most well-known themes which are then subtly, or not so subtly, worked into the Happy Birthday tune. Adding to the work are seventeen photographs, confirmation of Chris' other great love and skill. This will make a great birthday or Christmas gift for the piano player in your family. A gift that

A CULMINATION OF YEARS, NOT JUST REHEARSALS

When we watch a school music performance, it's easy to think of it as the result of a few weeks of intense rehearsal. But the truth is, these moments on stage are the culmination of years of music learning, years spent developing the technical skills, emotional resilience, and cognitive flexibility required to play an instrument and perform publicly.

This isn't just about music. It's about persistence, focus, collaboration, and confidence. All built note by note, mistake by mistake, over time.

The benefits of learning music stretch well beyond the rehearsal room. Students build stronger memory systems, improve their capacity to manage stress, and develop the ability to listen, to themselves, to each other, and to their world. Research shows that strong, sustained instrumental music programs across Australia are linked to improved academic achievement, better engagement with learning, and the confidence to take on new and complex challenges.

But music learning doesn't sell itself. We must advocate, constantly. That means sharing the benefits in big, obvious ways like concerts and open nights, and in small, quiet ones too. A comment to the business manager, a hallway conversation with a parent. Advocacy lives in both the spotlight and the margins.

If we want music learning to stay central in schools, we must make its value visible, over and over again. Every performance is proof. Every learner, a living example.






The Yuwun Elementary School Wind Band was established in 2011 with the dedicated support of conductor Mr Chia-Ming Hsu, executive director Ms Ling-Ya Yeh, and the parent association of Yuwun Elementary School in Tainan City, Taiwan.

Yuwun Wind Band consists of students from third grade to sixth grade, and is divided into two groups: Beginner Level (Group B) and Intermediate Level (Group A). The band actively participates in various performances and activities both on and off campus and holds regular concerts. Over the years, Yuwun Wind Band has consistently earned top honors in the Tainan City Student Music Competitions. Since 2017, the band is constantly selected to represent Tainan City in the Taiwan National Student Music Competition, where it is awarded Excellent Performance in Wind Ensemble Competition. 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KNOW YOUR VOLUNTEERS

Andrew Steindler

Andrew is a long-time member of Bondi Brass' trombone section and is our current Financial Officer. Andrew's mum, Elisabeth, is also a much-valued member of the band family and has previously featured in our *Know Your Volunteers* section.

How did you start playing a brass instrument?

Whether I ever agreed with signing up to be in the school band or not will be a conversation lost to time, but in Year 3 during one lunchtime I found myself in the school hall, with several other students, being given an instrument. It was a lottery that day. Some kids got saxophones, some got a trumpet, others got a flute or a clarinet, but I won big. Literally. I was given a euphonium!

It wasn't until high school, at the prompting of my music tutor, that I switched to trombone. The motivation was more practical than desire. My tutor had a trombone for sale and playing the trombone was something that had more potential should music ever have become a serious endeavour.

What do you do for your 'real job'?

At university I studied engineering. In my third and fourth years at university I began to specialise. Civil engineering initially and then the sub-discipline of geotechnical engineering. The highlight of this has been the opportunity to work on the construction and development of Western Sydney International (Nancy-Bird Walton) Airport, which will open in late 2026 to be Sydney's second international gateway airport.

What's your earliest memory of music?

Who can go past seeing the Wiggles before they became big. It would have been in the early nineties and the Vaucluse (Kimberley Reserve) playgroup organised for them to come and perform one day.

Favourite music/performer/concert?

Tom Jones, playing at Bitts Park, Carlisle UK. Tom Jones was great; however, nothing can match the reaction of two teenage girls watching a clip of their mother racing up to the stage and throwing a few articles of clothing onto the stage while Tome Jones was singing Sexbomb. Absolutely priceless!

Besides your current instrument what's the one other instrument you would really love to have learnt and why?

The saxophone. I would love to play a ripping saxophone solo. (Sounds like you should have been a child of the 80s!)

What's your earliest memory of ASBOF? How long have you been a volunteer?

My first Festival as volunteer was the final year that the event was held a Randwick Boys High School. That was probably around 2000. Apart from one or two years when I have taken a holiday to escape my volunteer duties, I have been at every school band festival helping out back stage.

How has ASBOF changed in the time you have been involved?

It has got bigger and embraced technology. When I first started the festival ran over two consecutive weekends in late July and early August. In the lead up to the event there would be a group of us sitting around a table stuffing envelopes with application forms, affixing address addresses and stamps.

Since then, the internet and technology has come along. Communications with schools and band registration is done via the festival's website, and tracking of bands from marshalling area to warm-up rooms to stage is now managed through an app. But the size of the festival has exploded. Three-hundred odd schools, over nine Sundays, in three different venues and running for two months.

What do you most like about ASBOF and why do you volunteer?

Seeing familiar faces each year. Whether it is other volunteers or the music teachers. There is a rhythm to the festival. It has unique appeal to it, that it is not about competition. Yes, Gold, Silver and Bronze awards are given to each participating band to reflect their relative skill, but primarily it is a festival of music and education. An opportunity for bands and musicians of whatever skill to be on a stage, to perform for their parents and revel in the opportunity to make music. It's that love and passions for music from all those who attend that keeps bringing me back each year.


If you won the lottery, what would you do?



MIDWEST CLINIC CHICAGO 2024 REFLECTIONS

In 2024 ASBOF supported two of our regular Music Director participants to attend the Midwest Clinic in Chicago, arguably the world's largest band and orchestra conference. Megan Lipworth and Maddy Shearer share with us some reflections on this experience.

Thanks to the generous support of ASBOF, I had the incredible opportunity to attend the 2024 Midwest Clinic in Chicago — an experience that was nothing short of transformative. As a first-time visitor to both the United States and this international conference, I was overwhelmed (in the best way) by the scale, calibre, and scope of the event.

Over four days, I participated in a range of clinics that explored leadership, curriculum development, ensemble pedagogy, and program administration. Standout sessions included Architecting Exceptional Music Programs, Teaching the Band You Have to Develop the Program You Want, Jazz for Leadership, Improving Student Retention in School Bands, and Becoming the Leader Your Students Need. These sessions were among many that challenged and expanded my thinking about what's possible in the Australian school music context, particularly in small or emerging programs.

I was also fortunate to witness outstanding performances by the United States Coast Guard Band, University of Illinois Concert Jazz Band, Naulu Winds of the University of Hawai'i – West O'ahu, and many others. The quality of performance, programming, and conducting across all ensembles was deeply inspiring and reaffirmed my passion for music education.

Perhaps most significantly, the Midwest Clinic fostered global professional connections and sparked ideas for new approaches in my own practice — from conducting technique and rehearsal planning to student leadership and mentoring strategies.

Attending the Midwest Clinic was a rare and invaluable opportunity. I return to Australia with renewed energy, a refreshed toolkit, and a deeper commitment to advocating for equitable, high-quality music education in schools. I'm sincerely grateful to ASBOF for making this professional development experience possible.

The Midwest Clinic, akin to Wonka's Chocolate Factory for musicians and music educators, a smorgasbord of information and inspiration! It fast became evident why it draws 18,000 attendees from across the US and 40 countries, with many prodigal devotees returning for an annual dose of PD, collegiate connection, and celebration. My greatest takeaway was ultimately somewhat intangible, and perfectly simply - a reinvigoration and reminder of the point of all this - and, if you're here at ASBOF, you already get it to - that music, itself, is good.

In practical terms, ensemble music brings students together and demands the highest levels of cooperation - a potent and effective training ground for success in any other context and endeavour. Music's demands are sophisticated and complex, and paired with the implicit opportunities for artistry and expression, music, uniquely, taps deepest into our shared humanity. The atmosphere at Midwest was electric with this humanity, with music as our glue.

In many of the demonstration schools and programs featured at Midwest, band is not extra-curricular. It's a class, with credit, specialist teachers, and dedicated spaces and facilities, that - even in the lowest socio-economic contexts - reflect the expectation that making music is core to school life, as important (if not more so!) as the 'Three Rs', and every child's right. Being at Midwest proved to me that this spirit is real, important, and has music at its heart.

On a global scale, music is the truest universal language, and therefore has the power and potential to connect us all. I'm personally and professionally grateful for ASBOF's dedication to supporting Aussie delegates to the Midwest Clinic, embedding us in the dynamic instrumental music education culture that is so strong there.

I encourage local music directors, educators, and composers to experience the Midwest Clinic at least once in their careers, to connect with a global music community, to learn from others' successes and innovations, and in turn proudly share our Aussie artistry, wisdom, universal musicality, and spirit.

Bondi Brass was established in 1958 by Cliff Goodchild OAM. Supported by the Waverley Council, the band has performed at many of Sydney's famous events and landmarks including the Sydney Opera House, Observatory Hill, the opening of the Sydney Film Festival, the opening of the Darling Harbour Convention Centre, Historic Houses Trust venues, religious processions and other community events. The band performs at Bondi Beach for the annual Festival of the Winds and Carols by the Sea, as well as fulfilling council Australia Day and Anzac Day obligations. Each year the Band travels to picturesque Dangar Island on the Hawkesbury River for a carols festival with the local community.

Bondi Brass boasts a proud history of nurturing the careers of many of Australia's leading brass players. Paul Goodchild (Associate Principal Trumpet, Sydney Symphony/Director, Sydney Brass) and Tom Burge (Charlotte Symphony) are two players with distinguished professional careers both in Australia and overseas who spent their younger days playing in the band.

Bondi Brass also supports Australian composers having commissioned the Concerto for Trumpet and Brass Band by Barry McKimm in 1995. In 2001 the Band commissioned a work by David Stanhope, which was premiered at the 40th Annual School Band Festival.

Bondi Brass draws its repertoire from the broad range of music available for brass bands, from the Renaissance dances of Tilman Susato to the music of modern Australian composers such as George Dreyfus, David Stanhope and Barry McKimm. In between there are selections from movies and musical comedies, folk songs, classical and romantic symphonies, pop tunes and of course traditional brass band marches.

There are currently over thirty members of Bondi Brass of various ages from a variety of professions, and with one of Australia's largest music libraries we can certainly find the repertoire to suit every occasion.
